Record Number of Eye Camps in 2013

In the last 12 months, TCF delivered over 3000 eye glasses to people who needed them the most. Donors, supporters and volunteers would be pleased to know that this time TCF collaborated with 4 different NGOs (TCA, Arogya Sandhan, Lily Foundation and Ushagram Trust) to deliver 21 eye camps in villages both near and far, surrounding Calcutta. One such eye camp was held jointly with Lily Foundation in Ghatsila, Jharkand, which was about 240 km from Calcutta, on 21 March 2013. Done in co-operation with Jagadish Chandra High School, mostly tribal people attended this eye camp. TCF held 12 eye camps with Arogya Sandhan and 7 eye camps with TCA, TCF's Calcutta chapter. Ushagram Trust also held one eye camp in Ushagram for TCF. In fact, during the period of 2012 - 2013 TCF was able to run more eye camps than ever possible in the history of the charity. It was made possible by your generous support.

A Message from the International Board of Directors

When, in 1988 a small group of Torontonians gathered in the grounds of Glendon College, York University to ask 'What can we do for Calcutta?" it seemed a tall order to plant a seed of charity in that city. But twenty five years later, the Toronto-Calcutta Foundation is a sturdy and flourishing plant amid the groves of charity there.

We are not a 'fashionable' charity, with large support from corporations, government, or famous people. We help poor village families, children and young women to meet some of their basic needs for pre-school education, health checks, and skill training. When necessary, we have improved the infrastructure of the schools in cooperation with the village councils. We raise our funds locally with the help of untiring volunteers. In Calcutta, we depend on dedicated staff and local leaders. Unfashionable perhaps, but very much appreciated by children and women otherwise excluded from education and health.

We have travelled far in these years, having had a period of support from the Canadian International Development Agency (1996-8) and the benefit of a guiding partnership with Gems of Hope.

Through trials of various projects we explored what was feasible for an organization of our capacities and funding to accomplish effectively, especially given the distance between Toronto and Calcutta, and the work of many other NGOs in Kolkata (previously known as Calcutta).

We see our core work in sustaining pre-schools in poor villages, delivering basic health services through mobile field clinics, sponsoring eye camps, and enabling women to attain sewing skills as worthwhile endeavours that have stood the test of time.

In recent years, we have gained strength through further partnerships, both in Toronto and in Kolkata, for instance Women's Habitat Etobicoke, RESULTS CANADA, Usha International Sewing School, Serum Thalassemia Prevention Federation, Rotary Club of Calcutta.

From time to time we have greatly benefited from the visits and field work of medical and educational experts from Canada and the U. K., and volunteers from Toronto. Corporate sponsors have been loyal to our cause, especially Suncor, which began its support from its inception.

And a new venture in education is our support to Uddipan Educational Trust, an arm of Kolkata NGO Arogya Sandhan at Habra, 24 Pagarnas, by way of 40 scholarships to allow deserving students to continue their education.

Our 25th anniversary year is no time to rest on our laurels and congratulate ourselves. Instead we see it as a time to evaluate our projects and renew our planning.

We thank all those in Kolkata especially Late Mrs. Sovana Bhaduri who donated her house to TCF for its main administrative and health facility and Toronto who have brought us to this point.

We look forward to the next 25 years when a new generation of interested and dedicated helpers and supporters will step forward to join in the enthusiasm that has fuelled the Toronto-Calcutta Foundation.

Coaching Classes — A New Initiative by TCF

The Toronto-Calcutta Foundation has partnered with Uddipan Educational Trust (an arm of Arogya Sandhan Charitable Trust) in Calcutta, India to provide special coaching classes to those students who are not in English medium school and come from not well-off families.

The special coaching for 20 students of grade IX will be for English, Science and Mathematics. In July 2012 ten boys and ten girls were selected. The program will continue for five years. During this period Grade IX students will be selected from the area's high schools each year and they will go through the program until they finish their high school certificate in grade 12.

The objective of this program is to ensure that these students get an equal opportunity to sit for the Joint Entrance examination which ultimately qualifies the student to get admission into Engineering and Medicine at university.

The selection process is carefully designed for fairness and student quality. There is a selection committee which looks at grade VIII marks. They visit the students' homes and interview the parents. And the students also sit for a test as a double check on their suitability for support to go forward in their education.

In 2013 the program now consists of 40 students (20 girls and 20 boys). Those first selected are now in grade X, while a new batch has been selected in grade IX.

In April 2013, TCF asked the students to participate in a writing competition. Out of forty students, seventeen students participated in the competition. Mrs. Sibani Pal, a long time TCF supporter evaluated the writings and our local auditors Mr. Prabir Sengupta and Mr. Dilip Guhathakurata have distributed the prize money to students in early June.



TCF's New School in Sunderban with 284 Students

TCF is now funding a new school named Baruipur Sitakundu Sneh Kunja (BSSK) in JharKhali village in Sundarban which is about 240 km away from Calcutta. The area is very underdeveloped and people are mostly fishermen and farmers. The school runs classes from pre-school to grade Viii. TCF recently renovated the washrooms for pupils.
